New Horizons Computer Learning Centers Review By: Paul Kurivchack

After writing software reviews for the past year, I now have the opportunity to write about something that is dear to my heart, Computer Training.

As a Computer Help Desk Analyst; for a major entertainment company with over 2500 computer users, I know first hand how the lack of computer training can hurt a companies day to day operation along with the PC users morale. Just reading a Dummies[™] book or any number of books out on the market just does not cut it for many people, including myself. Computer training classes are valuable to all computer users, provide the courses is designed properly to meet the day to day skills required by the computer user.

A new computer learning center recently opened in the

Princeton Market Fair complex, New Horizons Computer Learning Center. I was invited to attend any one-day class to give me the opportunity to see their facility, and experience first hand the level of training they provide. I scheduled a class on Beginning HTML, which I will speak about later in the article.

Founded in 1982, New Horizons is the largest worldwide Computer Training IntegratorSM, training more than 1.5 mil-

lion students each year. New Horizons offers businesses and individuals the freedom of choice with more than 300 applications courses and 200 technical training courses. A customized courseware library of more than 800 titles that span nine languages, multimedia computer-based training, an unconditional learning guarantee with repeat class privileges for up to six months and 24-hour seven-day-a-week free help desk support. At any one of our 200+ centers in 28 countries, New Horizons trains students in day, weekend and evening courses taught on Microsoft, Novell, Lotus, Corel, Adobe, Aldus, Apple Computer, Symantec, Sun Microsystems and UNIX, among other products.

New Horizons of Princeton offers state of the art facilities with six plus classrooms, individual Computer Base Training stations and staff areas. Each classroom is equipped with a network connected PC for each student, and a very comfortable chair. You may laugh about the chair being important. I have been to too many seminars, classes, and meetings that within the first hour sitting in the most uncomfortable chair in the world, the last thing on my mind was what the speaker was presenting. New Horizons did a fine job with their selection along with the bright and airy rooms. You do not feel cramped in!

The staff, from the receptionist upon entering, to my account executive, Richard Wenner, instructors and support staff was very friendly and enthusiastic about New Horizons and their new facility. They did recommend you arrive about twenty minutes early for registration and facility tour that was very helpful and allowed the class to begin promptly.

New Horizons offers a wide variety of computer classes from operating systems, word processing, spread sheets, data bases, desktop presentations, graphics and internet. I chose the beginning HTML class, as it is something I know little about and want to learn. This also let me go in without any preconceived notions about the subject.

The instructor, Debra Ramsthaler has a strong background in graphics and web design, who proved to have the patience of a saint, is an excellent teacher with great presentation skills. She started out with an overview of the day's agenda, and then moved on to an explanation of HTML and its use. There were six students in the class, one with some knowledge of web design, four experienced PC users and one poor soul who switched to this class from beginning Windows. Debra kept the class on schedule and provided hands on help when needed with the various exercises. In fact, I never realize how complex HTML is, but Debra kept it at a level that did not confuse us nor drop to a level to insult us. She made the class fun!

The Class, Beginning HTML for Windows 95 covered a lot of ground from HTML fundamentals, working with text, adding lists and graphs and hyperlinks. The user manual

supplied by New Horizons provided the script the instructor used for the course. Each module contained the Concept to be covered in that section, Tips, Tricks & Shortcuts, and a number of exercises to use the skills taught by the instructor. One of the more interesting aspect of New Horizons user manual and the company itself is they provide a complete listing of all exercise and support files needed for the class and can be downloaded from their web

site. This allows for continued mastering of the skills learned by following the user manual and the exercises. They also guarantee that if you need additional help, you can repeat the class – free of charge –any time within six months. If you have any questions while practicing your new skills at home or office, they have a 7 X 24 Help Desk that you can call for the next 60 days following the class to help you. What a great benefit!

Granted I will not be designing top-notch web pages like Jon Abolins, PPCUG Web Master tomorrow or next week. However, now I do have the fundamentals to look at the source code for Web Pages, understand it and start designing my own web pages to continue the learning process.

My day at New Horizons Princeton proved to be a very rewarding experience for me and I am glad that I took the time to attend their learning center.


